Initially, Noh and Kyogen served as educational and entertainment mediums for the Shogun, and they were also employed as instruments for public entertainment. Consequently, Noh stages were constructed within Edo Castle and other castles throughout the country.

Noh performances were consistently held during celebrations and significant milestones.





Tea Master


